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# AmeriCorps: 20 Years, 800K Volunteers, 1B Hours of Service

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This year marks the 20th anniversary of AmeriCorps. AmeriCorps is a U.S. federal government program that encourages people of all ages, and especially young people, to engage in public service at local nonprofit organizations, schools, and other community groups. It is built with strong bipartisan support to promote an ethic of service to others. Considered the domestic counterpart of the Peace Corps, AmeriCorps was created by the Corporation for National and Community Service.\* Since the program began, it has



included over 800,000 volunteers who have contributed more than one billion hours of service. At the time of induction, each volunteer recites the AmeriCorps Pledge,

including these words: I will get things done for America-

#### Abby Flottemesch joined AmeriCorps because, "as a

family, service was always more than what we do-it was about who we are." Her sister Jen joined AmeriCorps VISTA, which is a part of AmeriCorps, in Dallas when President Clinton signed the National Community Service Trust Act in 1993. Nine years later, Abby herself joined AmeriCorps VISTA in Puerto Rico. Her younger sister Angela then joined after Hurricane Katrina. Abby said that through AmeriCorps, she and each of her sisters "discovered more of who we are because we were given the opportunity to apply, explore, and develop our talents." After completing her year of service in AmeriCorps

as a lifelong public-service journey. She started working full-time as the Chief Development & Engagement Officer at an international nonprofit called Atlas Corps. As Abby describes her work, "we engage international professionals in a year of service." For example, "a doctor from Sudan dedicates a year of service at Susan G. Komen for the Cure in Washington, D.C. He shares his medical expertise while also gaining knowledge and a global network that he can bring back to his home country." Abby told us that this is just one example of how the organization enables individuals to apply their unique skills both to improve their communities and to advance their own abilities.

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
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
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
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
